COUNCIL TAX PRECEPT 2023/24

Over recent years, there have been significant changes in local government funding which has culminated in the removal of grant funding for this Council, however, this is offset to some extent by new housing. It is anticipated that further change will also be seen in the coming years. Every year, each Town and Parish Council sets a precept which is a charge that is determined locally and is added to, and collected with, Council Tax. This precept money is then used to provide services and amenities within the Parish. The Town Council is all too aware of the pressures of the current economic climate and the impact of the rising costs of inflation upon living standards. The Town Council has made a commitment for 2023/24 to continue to deliver its existing services and programme of community events while also progressing the expansion of Butterwick Road Cemetery, undertaking a significant programme of tree works and protecting areas of village green. The Council will continue to provide its not-for-profit dog bags service and has agreed for 2023/24 to subsidise these slightly so that users do not have any price increase. There will be increases to Parish Hall hire and allotment fees but these will be well below the current rate of inflation. The pricing structure for hiring the Parish Hall continues to support usage by local groups. The rise in Sedgefield Town Council's precept equates to an increase of 6.7% or £12.22 per Band D household per annum.

If you are visiting the cemetery and find a headstone marked with warning tape, please contact us so that we can provide you with the necessary advice on what to do next. If repair work is not undertaken by 31st March 2023, the council will oversee a programme of work to lay down these headstones.

Keith Wells was a true pillar of our community, becoming a wellknown name around the town since his move to Sedgefield in 1953. Along with his wife, the late Nancy Wells, Keith shaped our very town in myriad ways. Working as Town Clerk between 1969-79 was only one stamp Keith left here at the Town Council, others including being a Councillor for 20 years, representing the town as Mayor in 1986/87 and becoming Honorary Burgess in 1995.

Keith is remembered fondly by councillors past and present and was honoured with a minute's silence at the start of our November committee meetings. We share our deepest condolences with Keith's family, friends and all who have been touched by Keith's passing.

HONORARY FREEMEN AWARDS 2022 CONTINUED

Councillor David Brown is a true Sedgefield-ite having lived in the Parish his whole life. Always proud of his roots, David boasts a 60+ ball game attendance record, a feat which earned him the honour of starting off the game in 2009! An avid supporter of Sedgefield's Agricultural Show, David volunteered as Ring Steward for many



years, a role from which he has just recently retired. David first joined the Town Council in 2003 and was Mayor of Sedgefield in 2017/18. SEDGEFIELD FIBRE BROADBAND AVAILABILITY ISSUE UPDATE FROM COUNCILLOR JENNY HAWORTH

Late last year, I identified a problem with lack of fibre availability in some areas of Sedgefield. After 41 helpful comments from fellow residents, I took these issues back to Digital Durham and our local East Durham Rural Community AAP who were both incredibly helpful. Digital Durham confirmed there seemed to be an issue with ordering fibre for those on cabinets 1 and 3 in Sedgefield.

I am pleased to report this should now be resolved meaning residents on cabinets 1 and 3 (the green boxes on streets) should now be able to place an order for fibre service. These cabinets provide fibre to properties in West End, Queens Drive, Winterton Avenue, Station Road, and St Luke's Crescent.
