COUNCIL TAX PRECEPT 2025/26



Over several years there have been significant changes in local government funding which has culminated in the removal of grant funding for this council, however, this has been offset to some extent by new housing in the town in recent years. We anticipate that further changes to local government funding will also be seen in the coming years. Every year, each town and parish council set a precept which is a charge that is determined locally and is added to, and collected along with, Council Tax. This precept money is then used to provide services and amenities within that Parish.

Sedgefield Town Council is all too aware of the pressures of the current economic climate and the cost of living. The town council has made a commitment for 2025/26 to continue to deliver its existing services and schedule of community events while also progressing the expansion of Butterwick Road Cemetery, undertaking a significant programme of tree works around the town and protecting areas of village green. The town council, like all businesses, will be impacted by the increased employer's national insurance contributions from 1st April 2025. There will be increases

to cemetery fees and allotment fees, but these will be in-line with the current rate of inflation. In addition, there are going to be changes to the way in which Parish Hall hire fees are structured and charged to work towards the hall being more sustainable whilst recognizing its importance as a community asset. The rise in Sedgefield Town Council's precept equates to an increase of 8% or £16.53 per Band D household per annum.

LOCAL ELECTIONS

THURSDAY 1ST MAY 2025



Elections for both Sedgefield Town Council and Durham County Council will be held on Thursday 1st May 2025.

The administration of elections is carried out by Durham County Council who will soon publish the timetable for both elections with accompanying publicity material and nomination papers.

A copy of the timetable will be shared on our website over at sedgefieldtowncouncil.gov.uk, our X account (@SedgefieldTC), through the Residents' Database email group plus displayed in our office and noticeboards.

When the official notice of an election is published by Durham County Council, this will trigger 'Purdah' which is the pre-election period specifically between the announcement of an election and declaration of the final election results. This period prevents local and principal councils from making announcements about any new or controversial initiatives which could be seen to advantageous to candidates or parties in the forthcoming election, or which may commit any incoming new administration to policies which it wouldn't support.
